


TTIP Goals

- >> Immediate and reciprocal duty-free access for ALL textile, apparel, footwear, and fashion accessories
- >> Preserve the Berry Amendment in government procurement chapter
- >> Flexible rules of origin for footwear, textiles, fashion accessories, and apparel
 - Not yarn forward
 - Same proof of origin/customs enforcement for all products
- >> Harmonization and/or mutual recognition of regulatory standards

Regulatory Harmonization/Mutual Recognition

- >> Product Safety
 - Drawstrings, flammability, testing requirements
- >> Labeling
 - Generic names, fur, country of origin, care instructions
- >> Chemical Management
 - Reporting, labeling requirements, test methods
- >> Key Issue: Sub-EU and Sub-federal harmonization



Product Safety

- >> Key issue: Testing of Children's Sleepwear (aka the great pyjama vs. pajama debate)
 - U.S. CPSC declares pajamas as childcare article phthalate testing and certification required
 - EU does NOT consider sleepwear as childcare article
 - does not facilitate sleep (sucking or mouthing)
 - Recommendation: harmonized definition of childcare article to EU standard

Labeling

- >> Key issue: ISO vs ASTM Standards
 - Generic fiber names FTC now allows 2010 ISO standard, EU uses 2013 standard
 - Recommendation: Implement 2013 standard in TTIP, agree to mutual recognition of new names going forward
 - Care Symbols U.S. uses ASTM, EU uses ISO (Ginetex)
 - Both have pros and cons
 - Recommendation: Mutual recognition of both standards



Chemical Management

>> Key issue: Chemicals regulated at different levels; See: AAFA RSL (https://www.wewear.org/industry-

resources/restricted-substances-list/)

- >> Key issue: Sub-federal chemical regulation in U.S.; individual country regulations in EU
 - Recommendation: Harmonized approach to chemical prioritization going forward, mutual recognition of testing methods, chemical management at the federal level for U.S. and EU level
