Post-Hearing Brief Regarding for USITC Hearing on Investigation No. 332-556, Generalized System of Preferences: Possible Modifications, 2015 Review

Dear Secretary Barton:

The undersigned organizations are writing to express strong support for adding <u>all</u> eligible travel goods articles to the list of products that may be imported duty-free from <u>all</u> Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) beneficiary countries.

Designating these travel goods – articles like backpacks, purses, and luggage – as eligible under the GSP program for all countries creates the maximum benefit for the United States and the developing world.

Our members have advised that the widest possible GSP designations would enable them to lower duty costs, which will, in turn, enable them to create and support U.S. jobs, lower prices to benefit U.S. consumers, and/or spur innovation in these articles.

There is virtually no production of these items in the United States and, as such, there will be no domestic industry that will be negatively affected by the proposed designation. On the other hand, U.S. brands, private label designers, made-to-order producers, as well as the U.S. workers they employ and the consumers they serve, stand to benefit greatly from lower duty costs under the GSP.

Further, because most travel goods sold in the United States are imported from just one country, designating these articles as eligible for the full range of GSP countries would diversify sourcing, leading to job creation in communities throughout the developing world.

We urge that all statutorily-eligible travel goods be designated for all GSP eligible countries.
